JUNIORS LOSE.

Sophomores Prove to Be Strong and

In a stubbornly contested game, full of hard line smashing and end runs, mingled with an occasional forward pass, the Sophomores triumphed over the Juniors yesterday afternoon by the score of 11 to 0.

The Juniors played on the defensive the greater part of the game and were unable to check the rushes of the Sophomores. On about the Junior 20-yard line the Sophomores tried a forward pass which was blocked by a Junior, but Slaughter, playing left end for the Sophomores, recovered the ball and ran for a touchdown. Goal was kicked. Sophomores 6, Juniors 0.

Failing to gain through the Sophomore line, Bell was forced to punt, in whirlwind fashion. Slaughter caught up the ball and fell over the goal line in the northwest corner of the field for a second touchdown. Failing to catch the kick out, forfeited the try for goal. Score: Sophomores 11, Juniors 0.

By hard line smashing by Wongerien, Wood and Gallup, the Juniors carried the ball to the Sophomore 15yard line. Here the Sophomores braced and Bell executed a pretty drop kick for goal. It looked good, but was not allowed by the referee. This was the only chance the Juniors had to score.

No score was made in the second half, the playing being mostly in the center of the field. Sturzenegger for the Sophomores tried for goal, but the kick was blocked. The Sophomores were able to make long gains thru the Junior line and around the ends, Price, Sturzenegger and Lantz carrying the ball.
