In many universities these debates, evidently occupy a much more prominent place in the calendar of events of the college year than they do with us at Nebraska. In some schools mass meetings are held and other demonstrations made by the students, merely by way of evincing the interest felt by the student body in the work of the debating team, and the fact that they are loyal to everything which concerns their university. There is no reason why the interest in debating and the outcome of the intercollegiate debates among the students in this University should not be equally as strong as at other similar institutions.

broadened should by no means be "passed up." The man or woman who goes through college without having ever witnessed an intercollegiate debate, providing the opportunity was given, has willfully denied himself or herself a very important advantage.

Suggested Reforms.

As thoroughly in accord with its previous acts, the following are suggested as reforms for adoption by the Conference today:

- (1) No football team shall play more than one game during any one season.
- (2) No student who has ever been in any way prominent in high school athletics shall be eligible to represent a college in any way.
- (3) If two or more athletes eat simultaneously at the same table it shall be considered a violation of the training table rule.
- (4) Only those students who have been in residence for four years and have been elected to Phi Beta Kappa shall be eligible to represent any college or any athletic team. Said Phi Beta Kappa emblem shall be worn conspicuously on contestant's athletic uniform.
- (5) In view of the many and grave evils now existing in intercollegiate athletics, football, track, baseball and basketball shall hereafter be classed as minor sports, and handball, croquet, bowling and pingpong shall be considered major sports.
- (6) No student shall be eligible for an intercollegiate croquet, hand ball, bowling, or pingpong team who has ever given money for an opportunity to practice the game.
- (7) If the faculty of any college shall discover that more than one athletic team in the college shows prospects of success, all but one of these teams shall be suppressed.
- (8) It is the sense of the Conference that no Conference college shall engage in an athletic contest with any college which claims a championship as a consequence of athletic victories.
- (9) To avoid physical injury to contestants they may at their option play games by blackboard or by telegraph.
- (10) In order to avoid the chance of any attempt to deceive the men of an opposing team by any unusual plays, the captains of contesting teams shall exchange signals at least one week before the time of the game. Any play not covered by a signal in the hands of the opposing captain shall be explained to him before it is attempted. Violation of this rule shall be punished by forfeiture of the contest and the expulsion of the guilty team from the conference.
