BELIEVES IN IT.
President of Cornell Says Drill is the Right Thing.

Office of the President, Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y., Nov. 30, 1907.

To the Editor of the Army and Navy Journal:

My attention has just been called to an editorial in your issue of November twenty-third, entitled, "Nonsense in High Places." In this editorial I find myself described as "in opposition to the Army and Navy," and as an exponent of the doctrines that "the military spirit is an evil, that the profession of arms is an unworthy vocation, and the maintenance of the national defense a needless extravagance." And, as though I were blind to the value of military training, I am admonished to observe its results in the development of learning, the upbuilding of character, and the inculcation of correct ideals of American citizenship. Will you permit me to say that all this not only does me the greatest injustice, but entirely misrepresents my actual sentiments?

I am a firm believer in the value of military training. Year after year I have, in season and out of season declared that the military science and tactics required of students in Cornell University is the most valuable course we have, and that whether one considers the matter from the point of view of the needs of the Republic, the discipline of the University, or the physical and moral benefits to the students.

The support which, as president of Cornell University, I have always given our military department, is not only a matter of record in the War Department, but was recognized in the most complimentary way in an edi-

torial in the Army and Navy Journal, entitled "Military Training at Colleges," and appearing in your issue of December 15, 1906. This circumstance makes it unnecessary for me to dwell longer on this matter, in which I am sure you will not want to do me an injustice.
