Note 1. During the years 1902, 1903 and 1904 the first football game of the season was not counted as participation under this rule. In 1905 the first three (3) games of intercollegiate football were not counted. Now, however, all intercollegiate games are counted as participation.

Note 2. Athletes who were barred from competition during the first semester of their freshman year by the operation of the "semester rule" thus having their period of competition restricted to two and one-half years, will be allowed to compete for the full three years. (Minutes, June 1, 1907, p. 179.)
