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WIN PRIZES.

State Farm Exhibits Successful at Chicago.

The Nebraska Agricultural School made a very good showing at the Chicago International Stock Show last week. Twenty-two fat steers from here were exhibited and all but two of them were in the winnings. The total prize money won on them was \$900. The highest prize won by a Nebraska animal was the yearling championship of all breeds, won by the Angus steer, Flint. The grand championship of the show was awarded to a Shorthorn calf exhibited by a Canadian breeder.

Another prize given to Nebraska on account of the general excellence of our exhibit was one (possibly two) of the Armour scholarships in animal husbandry. These scholarships are for graduate work and are valued at \$250 each.

Last fall the animal husbandry department here planned to send a student stock-judging team to the Chicago show this year. They were unable, however, to carry out this plan.

The Chicago International this year was the largest stock show ever held in any country. The total entries in cattle alone were between 500,000 and 600,000. The attendance was between 400,000 and 450,000. This was considerably larger than last year notwithstanding the fact that no rates were given by the railroads this year. The International Stock Show brings more visitors to Chicago than any other annual event. It is also becoming popular among society people of Chicago.

An exhibit of German Coach horses from the kaiser's stables attracted considerable attention and favorable comment this year.

Only ten students from the State Farm went to the show this year. Special rates have been promised by the railroads for next year. If a satisfactory rate is obtained a special train will probably be sent from Lincoln. This exhibition is considered to be of great educational value and a large number of agricultural students from Nebraska have attended in previous years.

Dr. F. D. Hill, head of the department of Plant Pathology at the Experiment Station, delivered an address Thursday evening before the Botanical Seminar. The subject of his address was "How to Find Literature on Any Botanical Subject." Dr. Hill presented several bibliographies and lists and the best methods for their use, which was very helpful to those taking advanced work in Botany.
