BEAR GETS HIM.

Noted Russian Who was Here Thrown
Into Dungeon.

Mr. Tschlakowsky, the Russian revolu-
tionist who addressed a large crowd
at Chapel on May 15, has fallen into
the hands of the Czar's government
and is now in a dungeon in his na-
tive country. This news was received
by Russians living in this city and the
information was given to the Nebras-
kan by Felix Newton. Mr. Tschlak-
owsky and another patriot toured this
country last year and were here May
15th.

Mr. Tschlakowsky has been called
the father of the Russian revolution-
ary spirit and laid the foundation for
it in 1875. He was compelled to leave
Russia in the same year and went to
England where he worked energetical-
ly for his cause. Never ceasing his
fight, he wrote many articles in for-
eign newspapers and spread the spirit
of the movement over the world.
When the revolution broke out old
Tschlakowsky joined the movement
as a social revolutionist.

He became the soul of his party
and attracted to it many distinguished
men. He twice visited the United
States seeking the sympathy of the Am-
erican people for the cause of his op-
pressed countrymen.

A short time ago Mr. Tschlakowsky
returned to his native country and was
caught by the Czar's men. The Rus-
sians in America fear that he will be
killed.

NOTICE TO TEACHERS.

Students Seeking Certificates Asked
to Report.

All candidates for the university
teacher's certificate at the mid-winter
commencement should notify the sec-
retary of the teachers' certificate com-
mittee (G. A. Luckey) within the next
week.

The new school law which makes it
much more difficult to obtain teachers'
certificates in Nebraska does not ef-
fect the requirements as established in
the University but places the matter
of high school certificates in the hands
of a state examining board with au-
thority to inspect all schools granting
teachers' certificates. The profession-
al requirements for high school certi-
ficates as offered in the University of
Nebraska are taken as the standard to
which other schools will be asked to
conform before granting certificates.
This law means a great deal to the
teaching profession.

The department of education has
had several calls for men in normal
school and college work in the field of
education for which no suitable candi-
date seems at hand.
