EXTEND COLD HAND.

to come back they will have to do it in the dark, and take whatever the Conference wants to legislate into the rule book.

"It is not exactly that the Conference doesn't want Michigan back. What is wanted is that Michigan shall come back as it went out, if at all. If the seven-game rule had been voted unanimously it would have appeared as a plain 'sop' to Michigan."

"When Professor Patterson asked for the training table and the abolishment of the retroactive feature of the three-year rule, I think he was stating the condition on which his school was willing to return to the Conference. It was known that Michigan's demands would be laid before the meeting, but if it insists on such concessions as these, there is no chance of the school returning. The training table issue is dead. There was not the slightest chance of passing that resolution.

"Michigan got to play its four-year men last season, and it would be silly on our part to allow them to play men ineligible by the Conference rules again this season. The last batch of four-year men will get through college this year, and I suppose Michigan wants an extension of one year more in order to use these men."

From the expression of the professors, the collegians need not worry much over the seven-game schedule. It is regarded as highly probable by the representatives that two of the schools which voted against the measure Saturday will change their votes at the next meeting and pass the rule by more than two-thirds count.

The frame-up of schedules will not be in after the time allotted to Michigan has passed, notwithstanding the fact that the Wolverines are unlikely to have a place on any of the programs. Chicago and Wisconsin, especially, will have to hold out, for they were to play Michigan according to the arrangements of the late "Big Four" plan.

"The 'Big Four' will go through without doubt if Michigan should come back," said Coach Harry Williams of Minnesota. "Michigan objected to the movement last year, it is true, but this objection was only lodged because the school already had decided not to heed the Conference rules. I doubt if the Wolverines had the least objection to the plan itself.

"We have a tentative agreement with Chicago for a game, but the date has not yet been settled. We are in the same position with regard to Wisconsin. I cannot say whether Michigan will come back or not, but if not, then we will go ahead with a 'Big Three,' including Chicago, Wisconsin and ourselves."
