(Continued from page one.) to come back they will have to do it In the dark, and take whatever the Conference wants to legislate into the rule book.
"It is not exactly that the Confer ence doesn't want Michigan baek. What is wanted is that Michigan shall come back as it went out, if at all If the seven-game rule had been voted unanimously it would have appeared as a plain 'sop' to Michigan."
"When Professor Patterson asked for the training table and the abolishment of the retroactive feature of the three-year rule, I think he was stating the condition on which his zchool was wiling to return to the Conference. It was known that Michigan's demands would be lald before the meeting, but if it insists
oa such concessions as these, there is
no chance of the school returning. The training table issue is dead. There was not the slightest chancs f passing that resolution.
Michigan get to play its four-year men last season, and it would be willy ot our part to allow them to play men ineligible by the Conference rules sgain this season. The-last batch of four-year mn will get through college this year, and I suppose Michigan wants an extension of one year more in order to use these men."
From the expression of the profer ors, the colleglang need not worry much over the seven-game schedula. it. is regarded as highly probable by The representatives that two of the schools which voted agalnst the meas ure Saturday will change their votes at the next meeting and pass the rule by more than two-thlrds count:
The frame-up of schedules will not be in after the time allotted to Michi gan has passed, notwithstanding the fact that the Wolverines are unHkely
t have a place on any of the pro grames. Chicago and Wisconsin, es pecially, will have to hold out; for they were to play Michigan according to the arrangements of the late Blg Four" plan.
"The 'Big Four' will go through without doubt if Michigan should ceme back," said Coach Harry Willlams of Minnesota. "Michigan objected to the movement last year, it is true, but this objection was only lodged because the school already had decided not to heed the Confer ence rules. I doubt if the Wolverine had the least objection to the plan itself.

We have a tentative agreement with Chicago for a game, but the date has not yet been settled. We ere in the same position with regard h) Wisconsin. I cannot say whether Michigan will come back or not, but If not, then we will go ahead with Mg Three,' including Chicago, Wis consin and ourselves."
