State Agricultural Associations Will Be Here Soon.

Nineteen associations, known as the Nebraska State Agricultural Associations, will meet in Lincoln January 20-25. The most important of these are the Nebraska Poultry Association, the Nebraska State Horticultural Society, the Association of Agricultural Students, and the Nebraska Corn Growers' Association. There are also numerous breeders' associations.

The committee on arrangements has spared no labor to present a program which will hold the interest of the allied associations from beginning to end. Many specialists in agricultural pursuits have been engaged for addresses. Among the Nebraskans who will speak are Chancellor Andrews, University Regent Coupland, ex-Governor W. P. Poynter, E. M. Little, superintendent of the Nebraska Experiment Station, Prof. C. E. Bessey, and Governor George L. Sheldon.

Stock judging exhibitions will be held at the judging pavilion at the State Farm. A butter, milk and cheese exhibit will be open in the dairy building throughout the week. The usual beautiful exhibit of flowers and fruit will be made by the horticulturists. Other exhibitions will be the winter corn show and the boys' and girls' corn and cooking contests.

complished by the department which many scientists declared to be impossible. A large flat piece of rock, containing many pieces of bones from extinct animals, was cut out of the rock with such care that the bones were left sticking out in perfect condition. This piece of rock, about six feet long and four feet high, was boxed up and sent to Lincoln. It was placed in an oak case in the museum and now affords the only opportunity in the world Hereford & Petty; Rogers & Per. of seeing just how the bones are found in nature. The rock comes from Sloux county, Nebraska.

> The bad land corkscrews have been arranged in two great cases at opposite ends of the second floor. The back and bottom of the cases have been arranged to represent as nearly as possible the appearance of the bad lands. Around the bases of the corkscrews the plants familiar in the bad lands will be arranged.
