Students of Law College Will Try Cases Today.

Today will be a busy day in the College of Law courts, especially in the district court. There are two cases of importance coming up at 9 o'clock today. The first one is Bulla vs. Wentworth, for the foreclosure of a mortgage. There are six other defendants, and each one is represented by two attorneys, who present liens against the property of Wentworth. The attorneys for the plaintiff are McWhinney and Waldron, assisted by Hendricks; and for the defendants, Paul Spillman, Cowan, Shanvan, Allen, Crosby, Miller, Murphy, Perry, Randall, and Legro.

This case will come up at 9 o'clock in the Equity division of the district court under Judge Whelan.

The second case comes in the Law division of district court under Judge Beghtol at the same time. This case is Sturznegger vs. Stouffer, and is a jury trial. The attorneys are A. Thomas for the plaintiff and Paul for the defendant. The facts of the case: Mr. Stouffer owns a potato patch adjoining Mr. Sturznegger's horse pasture. Stouffer puts paris green on the potato plants to kill potato bugs. But some of the plants were so near the adjoining fence that Sturznegger's horses, two in number, ate the tops, and consequently got the full benefit of the paris green. They were both poisoned and died. Sturznegger brings action for damages.

Considerable interest has been manifested in the above case.

The justice court will be confronted with a full docket this morning, since many of the lawyers are anxious to get through with their cases before the end of the semester.
