**Special Class in Entomology.**

Owing to the continued and insistent demand for trained entomologists, Professor Bruner is instituting a special training class in entomology, the purpose of which is to prepare young men to fill positions in government, station and state work along entomological and related lines. The training is intended to include both the economic and systematic features, as well as museum and field work. The course will begin the first of next semester and continue through at least two school years. This course is offered only every third year.

A meeting of interested parties for discussing the plans and scope of the proposed work is called for Wednesday evening the fifteenth in the office of the state entomologist at the state farm. The time is eight o'clock.
