Engineering Notes.

The return steam pipes leading
from Nebraska and Mechanic Arts
halls to the power house have given
out, after eighteen years of service,
and are being replaced this week.
Superintendent O. J. Fee is taking ad-
vantage of the digging necessary to
this repair, to build a short tunnel
connecting the main steam tunnel
with Mechanic Arts Hall. The new
tunnel will be completed in a week
or two.

The first batch of flat scenery for
the new stage equipment of the Tem-
ple was installed yesterday, and it
was expected to complete the remodel-
ing of the stage today.

During the holidays the University's
new 2,300-volt, 3-phase generator was
installed, replacing the 220-volt D. C.
generator that has supplied power on
the temple for some years. At the
same time the several direct current
motors around the campus were taken
out, and the new 3-phase motors re-
quired by the new system were put in
place. While some temporary wiring
is still in use which will soon be re-
placed by permanent equipment, the
change of the power system is now
complete and all the electric power
used on the campus is now supplied
by the University power plant.

The University Farm transmission
line has been completed to the Farm
power house, and at present the un-
derground cables are being strung for
the distributing system at the Farm.
This work will be completed, and the
electric power for the Farm will be-
gin to be furnished by the University
power plant the present week.
