principles must indeed sound like the call of Gabriel to Populists who recall the planks of their own former political platforms.

The fact that duties and rights are complimentary is clearly outlined. When rights are granted to a corporation, certain duties must accompany them. The duties must be fulfilled just as the privileges are utilized.

President Roosevelt declares that law-defying wealth should be prosecuted to the extent of the law. Furthermore, the real men who instigate the offenses should be punished, not the mere puppets. He scores severely the use of advertising by offending corporations to create a wrong impression in the minds of the people. The attitude and utterances of certain speakers in this matter is also deplored. It was this declaration of the president's which was taken to heart by Cancellor Day of Syracuse University, causing him to heap further calumny on the head of the writer. The message concludes with a plea for honesty in business and politics alike and in fair-dealing between men.

In commenting on the message, Professor Caldwell thought the president drew no line between the amount of wealth which is justly or unjustly acquired. Personally, Professor Caldwell doubted whether any man could become a multimillionaire by fair means. However, he acknowledged such a possibility. But in any case, a man should no more make brutal use of excessive money power than he should so use physical force. Whatever our opinions on the details of the message may be, we still cannot but rejoice that these will have been again brought into prominence.
