LOYALTY TO CORNHUSKER.

Students Should Help Book.

Last year the Junior and Senior classes of the University elected a Cornhusker Board to have charge of this year's publication. They seem now to think that their responsibility in the matter has ended. It has not. The board has executive charge of the book, but there is still much latitude for class help. Just at present the Cornhusker needs jokes, cartoons and stories. If you know a good joke, put it in the box. The Appalachian Forest Reserve. Whereas:

There is a distinct need for proper forest preservation in view of our rapidly diminishing forest supplies; that this policy should especially prevail over areas which are preeminently suited for forest growth and of little economic use; and,

Whereas:

Forests are essential for the prosperity of the nation; that some means must be devised for curbing our reckless waste of timber and that means must be provided whereby we may perpetuate large areas of timber which will serve in preventing a serious timber famine with a consequent disorganization of immense industries in all portions of the United States; and,

Whereas:

The area proposed for National For-SHOES—Beckman Bros; Cincinnati ests in the White Mountains and the SAM'S CAFE Southern Appalachians is designed to include forest lands which are of more value in regulating stream flow than any other purpose and that the management of these forests by the government would conclusively prove the value of conservative forestry methods for the entire United States;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; That the Nebraska Park and Forestry Association does hereby declare itself heartily in favor of the bill for acquiring National Forests in the White Mountains and in the Southern Appalachian Mountains; and, be it it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, U. S. Forester Pinchot, and the Nebraska senators and Congressmen.

The foregoing was adopted by the Nebraska Park and Forestry Association at its annual meeting in Lincoln, January 23, 1908.
