

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## REGENTS MEET.

Create College of Education-Dean Fordyce at its Head.

The Board of Regents met Friday and created the College of Education, with Dean Fordyce of Wesleyan University as dean. The salary of Dean Fordyce will be the same as the other deans, \$2,400 a year. The department of Education has been asking for a College of Education for some time, so that the work might be carried on to a better advantage. In order to give a Thorough training to high school teachers a model school will be conducted at Fourteenth and W streets.

No action was taken in regard to the purchase of a new athletic field, except to appoint a committee to confer with a committee of the Athletic Board. The board was reorganized and J. S. Dales was re-elected secretary. Several other committees were appointed, but nothing definite was accomplished. Another meeting will take place the last of this week.

## Convention a Success.

The thirteen delegates who attended the Y. M. C. A. convention at Norfolk came back this morning feeling that their time had been well spent and that it was one of the best state conventions ever held in Nebraska.
