SIGMA XI LECTURE.

 "Mr Fletcher has for some years been convinced of the desirability of restricting the amount of food, especially protein food, and masticating it thoroughly. In the latest tests Mr. Fletcher was able to lift 300 pounds 350 times, while similar tests on Yale athletes gave an average of 87.4 lifts. After these tests Mr. Fletcher's nervous control was so good that he could hold a glass of water filled to the brim in either hand without spilling any. Of these tests Dr. Anderson of the Yale gymnasium says: 'During the thirty-five years of my experience in physical training and teaching I have never tested a man who equalled this record.' The latter tests given in June, 1907, were more taxing than those given in 1903, but Mr. Fletcher underwent the trials with more apparent ease than he did four years ago. What seems to me a most remarkable feature of Mr. Fletcher's tests is that a man nearly 60 years of age should show progressive improvement of muscular quality merely as the result of dietetic care with no systematic training."
