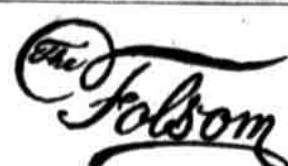
Although I often have inquiries from young women of the University concerning the opportunities offered by library work as a profession, the infrequency with which I am consulted in this matter by the men students leads me to think that the nature of librarianship is but little known among the undergraduate body. Many think of it as a merely clerical employment which can be readily undertaken by anybody who writes a legible hand. Others suppose it to be similar to selling goods over the counter and to consist of handing out the books demanded and receiving those that are returned. As a matter of fact there is a large and increasing demand for young men and women with university education and library school training to fill positions in the library world. Especially is there a call for men of proper qualifications to undertake the more important duties, particularly
