With the execution of Savonarola,
Michelangelo fled to Bologna almost
crushed. The death of his idol gave
a more sombre, tragic cast to all his
later work, which naturally tended
that way.

With the completion of his "David"
at Florence, Michelangelo, who with
marvelous skill had utilized a ruined
piece of marble of another artist, had
passed his Doctor's examination. The
spirit of it, though excellent, is
not the highest, but the technique is
supreme. Michelangelo was now in
his thirties. He could do anything.
The question was not what could he
do, but what would he do? What
would his mighty inspiration force
him into?

Language Requirement for Degree.

Many graduate students have con-
siderable difficulty in meeting the
modern language requirement for the
Ph. D. degree. In order to assist such
students the departments of French
and German have arranged to admit
candidates who have had language
work earlier in their course simulta-
neously to a reading course and an
elementary course, in which they may
review those points which are essen-
tial in passing a satisfactory exami-
nation. Graduate students will great-
ly facilitate their work if they can
satisfy this language requirement
during the summer session, since that
enables them to take up their special
studies in a more satisfactory way
during the regular session.

Nu Sigma Nu Initiation.

Last Friday evening, at the Nu
Sigma Nu fraternity house, 1509
South Twenty-sixth street, Omaha,
the following were initiated into the
mysteries of that organization: J. C.
Elder, A. A. Bald, J. L. Wilson and
