 cares who control athletics. If they elect "N" men, all right, and if they elect others all right too, but let the old rule stand.

A STUDENT.

I favor the proposed method of electing student members of the athletic board for several reasons.

Under the new system all wire-pulling and political manipulations would cease. The best man, all things considered, would then be elected re-new members would exert much more influence with the board than heretofore, because the board would know that these student members were elected by the expressed will of the student body as a whole, and not be the purchased vote of a bevy of girls or the clique vote of some particular crowd.

With a strong representative board composed of athletes who are thoroughly acquainted with their duties, all branches of athletics at our University would mean more to "barb" and "frat" men alike.

The University is larger and more important than any of its parts. And keeping the best good of Nebraska above all petty, selfish considerations, let us refuse to take account of whether a man be a "frat" man or a "barb" and cast our ballots for candidates on the basis of merit alone.

Every male student has a right to cast his vote for his choice of eligible candidates. Let's play fair and give every male student a ballot. We can do no less.

Do we not want a student board truly representative because elected by the whole student body, strong with the board because representing the expressed will of all the students, and therefore calculated to broaden all athletics and deepen our spirit for Nebraska?

To Editor of the Nebraskan—A few objections may be brought against the action of the athletic board in its recent plan for arranging more general interest in the administration of University athletics, for this is manifestly the fundamental purpose in the movement.

Some may object to limiting the candidacy to "N" men, but in answer, it can be said that this will get rid of much of the "class machine" kind of politics. An "N" man, besides being one willing to work for and able to understand athletic problems, must essentially be more than a "ward politician."

Again, some organizations may be unwilling to give up the representation they are sure of on the board whenever their "term" comes. It may not be generally known that there is among the fraternities a well organized schedule whereby each organization gets its man named as a candidate in a certain order. Five fraternities are represented this year, five different ones next year and so on. Also, contributions to the "slush fund" are regulated among the organizations with the same sort of precision. This smacks too much of management.

The present scheme aims at elimination of factional fights and it is the most plausible and sane ever suggested for arousing genuine, broad, enthusiastic interest in Nebraska athletics—an interest just now particularly needed.
