REINSCH LECTURE

A SERIES OF LECTURES FRIDAY AND SATURDAY.

Writer of Many Books on Political Science—Now Head of Department at Wisconsin.

One of the most important of the many series of lectures which will be given at the University this term will occur Friday and Saturday of this week when Prof. Paul S. Reinsch, head of the Political Science department of Wisconsin University, will give three lectures on Political Science and Sociology.

Professor Reinsch is acknowledged to be one of the greatest authorities on Political Science in the United States. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and one of the foremost American writers on contemporary political subjects. He first attracted attention in 1900 as an author, when he published his first political work, "World Politics." Later he published, "Colonial Administration" and "Colonial Government." He was one of the leaders in organizing the American Political Science Association and is now one of the vice-presidents of the same. In 1906 he was one of the United States commissioners to the Pan-American Conference held in Rio Janeiro.

Professor Reinsch has been on the western coast since last January, where he has been giving a series of lectures to various educational institutions. He is now returning to Wisconsin and will stop over in Lincoln for two days. While in Lincoln he will give two lectures at the Temple, as follows:

Friday, 5 p. m., "The Present Situation in Russia."

Friday, 8 p. m., "The Reform Movement in China."

In addition to the above he will give a talk Saturday at 10 a. m. in U. 106, on "Investigation in Political Science."

The lectures are free and open to all. They will be found instructive and entertaining.

Athletics at Washington University are at a stand-still. Owing to friction between the students and faculty, the schedule of the basketball team has been countermanded and the team, which promised to be the best in the history of the university, has disbanded. As a climax to these developments, Blanchard, who has coached the football team for two years, has been requested to hand in his resignation.
