be expanded down to one pound absolute while reciprocating engines cannot economically expand lower than to four or five pounds absolute. Constant speed and load service such as marine, electric and centrifugal pump work. It cannot be reversed and is no more economical than a good reciprocating engine. There is no danger of the turbine supplanting the reciprocating engine except in certain work, but there is a possibility of gas engines supplanting both of them on account of its superior economy.

In conclusion Professor Richards showed some views of the motors and plans of the Mortania. The motors are of about seventy thousand horsepower, or an equivalent of about 2, 100,000 men working in three shifts. The food necessary for this many men would be far in excess of the fuel used in the boilers. The lighting plant has a capacity of 1,500 K. W., or about as much as is used in Lincoln. The boiler plant consists of twenty-three double ended and two single ended Scotch Marine boilers of about 160,000 square feet of heating surface. The ship is about eight hundred feet long and is seventy-nine feet from the engine room floor to the sky light. The latest development of the turbine is Professor Rateau's motor for using exhaust steam from the large rolling mill engines used in the steel mills.

President Butler of Columbia and Chancellor McCracken of New York University will lecture in Copenhagen next fall. They are the first men chosen in the interchange of lectures between Denmark and the United States.

Dean Andrew F. West of Princeton asserts that entrance requirements to graduate work are generally too low, and inevitably draw men of mediocre ability. As remedies he suggests higher salaries for professors and giving them greater honor in a social way.

During a severe blizzard on the night of February 21, Clarence Robinson, a student of Hedding College, was gagged, bound hand and foot, and tied to a tree on the campus. He struggled desperately in the blinding snowstorm and about midnight succeeded in unfastening the cords which held him. Then nearly exhausted with cold and with his feet stiff and bound, he crawled several blocks to his boarding house. In consequence of this brutal hazing, three of the students were expelled and two suspended.
