Thirty bachelor members of the university faculty held a meeting recently and started plans that will probably result in the erection of a faculty club house some time in the near future. Professor A. J. Boynton,

of the economics department, was chairman of the meeting and is the originator of the idea that promises to change materially the social life of the unmarried members of the faculty.

The freshmen of the University of Indiana got a warm reception from the sophomore class, which armed itself with shears and went on a hair-cutting expedition. A number of reshies were caught and shaved clean, while the sophomores filled their pockets with the scalps and waved the tufts of hair triumphantly as they marched through the streets giving yells of "1911." The attack of the sophomores was the result of the work of W. T. Doty, who halls from the town of College Corners, O. Doty conceived the idea of establishing a boarding house for freshmen only and he advertised it profusely all over the town.
