SORORITY GIRLS ARE REAL MAD.

Hold Meeting to Consider Opposition
 to Rules of Faculty.

For the purpose of opposing the pro-
 posed general house rules for women
 the sororities of the University of
 Washington have called a panhellenic
 meeting, says the Pacific Daily Wave.
 Since the conference on Tuesday
 night excitement has pervaded the
 sorority circles. Also indignation has
 been expressed by the men of the
 college who will be ousted unceremon-
 iously when the curfew rings out the
 house rules hour.
 "Why, I am old enough to be run-
 ning a home of my own," lamented a
 sorority woman yesterday, "and yet I
 can not go down to the theater on a
 week day. I can not invite two of my
 friends to a chafing dish feed in my
 own house. I wish I were back in
 boarding school, where some levity is
 allowed."
 "Some of the rules have not been
 adopted yet. All of the sororities are
 determined to oppose them. I believe
 that a more sane set of regulations
 can be adopted. We ought to have
 some rules, I know, but a mistake of
 about ten years in our ages has been
 made by the faculty ladies."
 When asked what it was proposed
 to do in the panhellenic meeting of
 the sororities, another prominent co-ed
 said:
 "There is no use in one sorority at-
 tempting to go ahead with an objec-
 tion. All of the women realize that.
 We must unite. It is not our intention
 to rebel. In fact, the matter has been
 left to us for consideration and we in-
 tend to act justly. All of the soror-
 ities are agreed that the proposed
 rules are harsh. It is all right to
 have uniformity of house rules, but
 I would rather have them uniformly
 good than uniformly harsh."
