ALL AMES CONFIDENT
SHOWING OF THE AGGIES AT MIS-
SOURI ENCOURAGES ROOTERS.
GREAT OPEN GAME EXPECTED
New "Peek-a-Boo" Plays of "King"
Cole Has Williams Guessing and
the Students Are Anxious to
See Them Uncovered.

AMES, Ia., Nov. 5.—Practice began
here in earnest Tuesday night for the
Nebraska game. The showing made
at Missouri greatly encouraged both
the coaches and the student body.
They are also highly pleased because
the squad came back practically in-
tact. The only man who suffered
from injuries was Graham. His in-
juries are not serious, however, and
he will probably be in shape to start
the game.

There is no spirit of overconfidence
here. In spite of the great showing
made at Missouri, Nebraska is un-
doubtedly on paper the stronger team.
This condition results from the loss
of Jeanson, Brugger and Reppert from
the Ames squad. With these three
men in the game the strength of the
two teams should have been nearly
equal.

Nebraska's advantage now seems to
lie chiefly in the line and in the quar-
terback position.

Those at the Iowa City game were
greatly impressed with the strength
of the Nebraska end tackles. Captain
Law will take care of one tackle pos-
ition for Ames, but the man who plays
the other tackle position and the two
ends are all inexperienced. The
Ames line is undoubtedly much the
lighter but swifter of the two. The
backfields seem to be evenly matched
both in weight and speed. The Lam-
berts and Hubbard are undoubtedly
three of the fastest backs in the west.
Nebraska has probably a slight advan-
tage in the speed of its quarterbacks,
but the headwork shown by Reggen
in the Missouri game was all that
could be demanded. The punting of
Lambert at Missouri excelled any-
thing shown by the Nebraska backs
this year and in the game as it is
played today Ames will undoubtedly
make the most of this.

Students Are Enthusiastic.
Considerable enthusiasm is being
shown here and every student who
can possibly rake up the money de-
clares he is going to Omaha to see
this game. Wednesday a large mass
meeting was held. The freshman
who did not know what one of the
contests means to college life had it
brought home to him forcibly today.
At every turn he was greeted with
signs which read "On to Omaha,"
"Pawn your old shoes and go to the
game," "Mass meeting tonight." The
band was out and played college airs
until the student body went wild with
excitement. A number of speeches
were made. It is probable that a
series of these meetings will be held
and undoubtedly the student body will
give an exhibition of loyalty at the
Nebraska game which has not been
surpassed in the history of the insti-
tution.

The game should be exceedingly in-
teresting from the spectator's view-
point. Both Williams and Cole are
famed exponents of the forward pass.
There will probably be more open
play in this game than in any other
game played west of the Mississippi
river this fall, for the teams are so
evenly matched that the coaches will
have to depend upon forward passes,
outside kicks and punts to advance
the ball.

The student body is very anxious to
see Nebraska's "peek-a-boo" and they
are certain that it will be displayed
on this occasion unless it exists only
in the fertile imagination of some
Lincoln newspaper artist. Nebraska's
"peek-a-boo" at Iowa City seemed to
consist largely of mass plays by the
tackles. With this they were able to
"peek" through the Iowa defense.
With this in mind it is probable that
a good deal of attention will be de-
voted to perfecting Ames defense at
these points.

A round trip rate of \$3 has been
secured for the game. They will go
by way of the interurban to Fort
Dodge, thence over the Great Western
to Omaha.

INITIATION OF PHI RHO SIGMA
Medical Fraternity Will Take in New
Men Tonight.

Phi Rho Sigma, one of the two fra-
ternities of Nebraska medical stu-
dents, will hold an initiation of
pledges in Omaha this evening. This
society, which is national in its scope,
maintains its chapter in Lincoln as
a branch of the Omaha chapter and
for this reason the initiation stunts
are pulled off in the latter city.

Phi Rho Sigma, in common with
other medical fraternities, bears an
enviable reputation for unique and se-
vere initiation penalties. So far as
can be learned, no initiate has ever
succumbed to the ordeal, but the nar-
row escapes are said to be numerous.
