PROFESSOR HOWELL SURPRISED.
 Pupils Give Surprise Party in Dramatic Club Rooms.
 The elocution classes of the university gave a surprise party for their instructor, Professor Alice Howell, Friday evening, in the Dramatic club rooms of the Temple. About fifty were present and all report it a memorable occasion. A program, although for the most part impromptu, was very inter-
