COLE TO QUIT HERE?
 SAID TO BE SLATED TO TAKE YOST'S PLACE AT MICHIGAN.
NO CREDENCE IS GIVEN RUMOR
 Believed "King" Will Stay at Nebraska Yet Another Year and That Yost Will Continue With Wolverines.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 20.—Coincident with the departure of the Michigan football team tonight for Syracuse, where the wolverines close their season Saturday, appeared the rumor that "King" Cole would succeed Yost as coach of the Michigan team, the change to take effect next fall.
 Yost's contract with the Michigan athletic association has another year to run, and for that reason little credence in the reported change is entertained by the leading athletic spirits here. Perhaps Yost has made up his mind to give up football, and, if he has, Cole would be as apt to be tendered the position as anybody. Cole was one of the stars of Yost's early teams and has been highly successful as a coach since leaving Michigan.
 There is no feeling here that Yost has lost his cunning as a developer of football teams. The "hurry up" man has he unlimited confidence of the entire student body and none of the rooters hope to see his successor named.

A Good Feeling.
 The feeling here is that Yost has done all that any coach could with the same material. Not more than one or two men on the present team could have made the second team during the first four years of Yost's work here. The material for ends and backs has been exceedingly weak, and nobody knew that better than Yost. He simply did the best he could under unfavorable circumstances.
 Another story that is heard now and then is to the effect that fraternity influences have hurt Michigan's football chances. Such statements as that have always been discounted among the students, for Yost has never let outside affairs cut any fig-

ure with the team. It has always been the best man for the place. University authorities say they know nothing of any contemplated change in the football coach.
 Coach Yost and Trainer Fitzpatrick took the seventeen eligible men to Syracuse, and with these they must attempt to win. Wasmund is still badly battered up, and it is quite possible that Cunningham, the sub quarter, will have to take his place before the game is over Saturday.
 Schulz will start the game at center, but it is hardly probable that he can last throughout the contest.

The story from Ann Arbor is given no credence by Manager Eager and the Nebraska players. Manager Eager said last night that he had heard nothing about Cole's probable succession to Yost's place and that he believed the "King" would remain here.
 Coach Cole left for Minneapolis last night and he was not interviewed.
