So far as the game with Wisconsin is concerned, I was elated. I believe unquestionably that was the best game I have seen in the era of the new game. It was magnificent to watch and a great fight all through. It is impossible to compare the team this year with those we had in the era of the old game, but I can say that this team was the best we have had since the new game has been played.

DIVINITY CLUB HOLDS MEETING.

Professor French Speaks on Theological Problems.

Last Friday evening in the Science room of the Temple, the Divinity club held the first meeting of the year. Nearly all of the old members, together with several new, were present and an interesting and instructive time is reported. The University of Nebraska has no theological department, but many students are studying philosophy and relative subjects here with the idea of going into a theological institute later. The Divinity club was organized last year for the purpose of promoting good fellowship among these students. The club meets twice a month and listens to a lecture from some one interested in this line of work.

Professor French of the Philosophy department was the speaker of the evening. He gave an interesting and instructive talk on "The Problem of Christian Theology Today." In his introductory remarks, Prof. French reviewed the history of Theology or the

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science of God. He began with the primitive conception of God as a man-God, ruling his world as a power and with individuality entirely separate from the world. Theologians from time to time have been driven from one position to another during the history of their work. Finally, in our day, the theologian seems to be compelled to accept the immanence of God in the world. Dr. French concludes that the problem of Christian theology today is to meet three important issues—the reign of law in nature as proved by science; psychological criticism of religious emotion, and scientific criticism of the Scriptures.
