**"A Girl at the Helm."**  
 "A Girl at the Helm," the lively musical show now in its fourth month at the La Salle theater, Chicago, has been so successful that Manager Mort H. **"Civil Service Examination."**  
 The United States civil service commission announces an examination on December 29-30, at Omaha and Lincoln, to fill a large number of vacancies in the positions of clerk and teachers in the Philippine service. Entrance salary ranges from \$1,200 to \$3,000 per annum for men and \$900 and up for women. The examination will be over the following subjects: Three hundred word thesis, penmanship, arithmetic, geography, physiology, grammar, history and civics, nature study and drawing, science of teaching, and experience, training and general fitness. In addition to the above there are many optional subjects which may be added by permission.
