## SPEAK TO DEBATERS

NEBRASKA MEN TELL OF DE-BATES IN THE LEAGUE.

### PROFIT BY OTHERS EXPERIENCE

Professor Wilson Tells of the Fine Campus and Buildings at the University of Iowa at lowa City.

A new feature was introduced into the work of the university debating squad yesterday afternoon when the members of the squad, together with such others as were especially interested in debating, met to hear comments upon the other debates of the league made by men who were present at these debates. There were about twenty-five debating enthusiasts present and the meeting lasted over an hour.

Nebraska was particularly fortunate this year in having a large number of faculty members present at the other debates as judges, so that the debaters have been able to profit not only by the experience of their own school in the recent debate, but also by the experience of others schools. Professor Wilson spoke of the lowa-Wisconsin debate at Iowa City; Dr. Maxey spoke of the Nebraska-Wisconsin debate at Madison; Dean Ward, who was a judge with Professor Wilson at the Iowa-Wisconsin debate, told of his impressions while there, and Professor Taylor told of the Minnesota-Wisconsin debate at Minneapolis.

### Have Fine Campus.

Professor Wilson declared that one of the things which impressed him wonderful university plant. A definite plan was early adopted in the ar-W. A. Robertson and R. A. Mosley rangement of buildings on the campus and in the nature of the buildings to be constructed. Professor Wilson declared that the debate at Iowa City emphasized clearly the superiority of extemporaneous work over prepared and memorized work. The opening of each speech ous, and as a result the closing was

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> Dr. Maxey, who accompanied the Nebraska team to Wisconsin, spoke briefly of that debate. He declared that each Nebraska man did well and presented his material in a highly creditable manner, and that the outcome was uncertain until the decision of the judges was finally announced. Dr. Maxey especially emphasized the manner in which they had been treated while at Madison. and declared that the people of the university did everything possible for their complete happiness except to give them the decision.

In speaking of the Iowa-Wisconsin debate. Dean Ward declared that the whole thing was lost in the rebuttal speeches. The first speeches seemed to be largely prepared beforehand, but in the final speeches it was evident just what each side was capable of doing. Dean Ward also declared that there was a very dangerous use of false evidence, and at some times a scant use of facts to back up theory.

Professor Taylor spoke briefly of the Wisconsin-Minnesota debate, and declared that the weak points in this debate differed very materially from the weak points in the other debates of the league that he had heard about, as the debate was decided by the direct arguments of the two teams.
