**MASONRY IS NOW COMPLETED.**  
New Engineering Building Makes  
Rapid Progress.  
During the Christmas vacation, work  
on the engineering building has  
gone rapidly forward. The warm  
weather has made it possible for the  
masons to work nearly every day dur-  
ing the last three weeks, and the walls  
of the second story are now nearly  
complete. Only about five feet of  
masonry remains to be done on the  
front part of the building and the  
structure will then be ready for the  
roof.  
Carpenters are now at work fitting  
up the trusses for the two one story  
rear wings. According to present  
plans these will be enclosed so that  
the workmen will have a sheltered  
place in which to work.  
During the vacation Professor Rich-  
ards finished the plans and specifica-  
tions for the electric wiring and the  
power plant. Bids for this part of the  
work will soon be taken.  
The contractors expect to finish the  
brick work during this month if a  
reasonable amount of fair weather  
makes it possible. If the next few  
weeks should be very cold this would  
probably be impossible, for it is not  
possible to build up masonry work  
when the mortar freezes rapidly. No  
work was done on the building Christ-  
mas and the day after, as a large num-  
ber of the workmen live in Omaha  
and it was desired to give them an op-  
portunity to spend the day at home.
