WILL KEEP BASEBALL
WISCONSIN ATHLETIC COUNCIL
ALLOWS TWELVE GAMES.
COACH STAGG WEEDS OUT SQUAD

Graduates for Maroon Nine Are To Be
 Cut Down to Bunch That Can Be
 Easily Handled This
 Season.

MADISON, Wis., Jan. 20.—The
 movement to abolish inter-collegiate
 baseball at the University of Wiscon-
 sin has failed. The athletic council
 last night authorized Dr. Hutchins,
 athletic director, to arrange for a
 schedule of twelve games for the com-
 ing season, six to be played in Madison
 and the rest away from home.
 Two games each will be played with
 Chicago, Illinois, Purdue, Northwest-
 ern and Minnesota. The dates are not
 definitely fixed. Two remaining games
 will be played with Marquette college
 or some other small institution.
 The athletic council voted to have
 a new racing shell built for the varsity
 eight for use in the Poughkeepsie re-
 gatta next June and two four-oared
 barges for training purposes.
 The council also decided to build
 eight outdoor handball courts, im-
 prove the tracks and diamonds at Ran-
 dall field and to pay the expenses of
 the gymnastic team at the annual
 meet.

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—Coach A. A.
 Stagg instituted a new system of base-
 ball coaching yesterday at Bartlett
 gymnasium. Despite the fact that his
 baseball squad now numbers only thirty
 men, the director began a series of
 "weeding out" processes, aimed to cut
 the bunch to a state of efficiency even
 though it should diminish it to a still
 more attenuated state.
 Coach Stagg devoted most of the
 afternoon to the diamond aspirants.
 He announced that he would accept
 only such candidates as could qualify
 under three tests.
 Among the candidates who succeed-
 ed in winning Stagg's approval to
 some extent were Captain "Jimmy"
 Meigs, first base candidate; Cleary,
 Stearns and Collins, outfielders; Sun-
 derland, pitcher; Steinbrecher, Rock-
 well and Stangl, catchers, and Pegues,
 infielder. Page and Ross will join
 the squad in the near future, it was
 announced.

GREEK COURSES OFFERED.

The department of Greek history
 and literature offers the following
 courses open to all students during the
 second semester, 1908-09.

Course 2b.
 Greek in English—This course is
 based primarily on the study of Eng-
 lish words derived from the Greek,
 with special reference to modern liter-
 ary and scientific terms. It is intend-
 ed primarily for those students who
 desire to obtain, in one semester, a
 fair knowledge of the Greek elements
 in our own language. The course may
 also serve as a preparation for course
 3. No previous knowledge of Greek
 is required. Five hours' attendance.
 Five hours' credit. Daily at 2 p. m.
 U. 201.

Course 26.
 A Trip to Greece—During the sec-
 ond semester Professor Lees will
 again conduct a class through "A Trip
 to Greece." The itinerary will follow
 the routes pursued by him during two
 tours of Greece taken in former years.
 The aim of the course will be to pre-
 sent clearly to the student the appear-
 ance of Greece as it is today; its
 topography, architecture, theaters,
 temples, etc., explained by lectures
 and illustrated by lantern views. One
 hour attendance. One hour credit.
 Tuesdays at 3 p. m.

Course in Zoology.
 The Department of Zoology offers a
 beginners' course in Zoology the sec-
 ond semester. This course, Zool. A.,
 covers the same ground as Zool. I and
 II, a year's work in one semester.
 Class meets daily 10 a. m., N. 210.
 Five hours' credit.

 covering subjects of customs, homes,
 costumes, industries, amusements,
 traditions, development of the arts,
 etc. Six written reports on assigned
 readings during the semester. One
 hour attendance. One hour credit.
