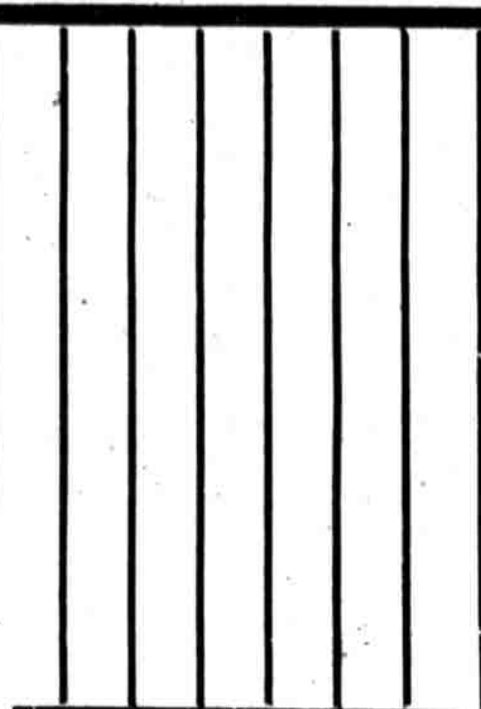

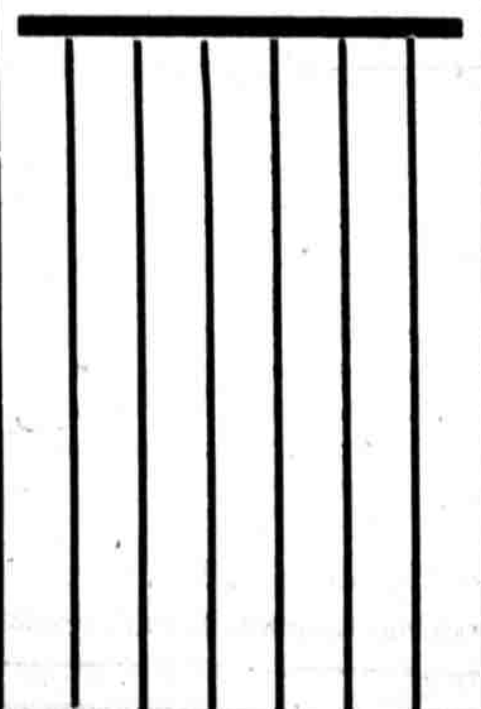

PERSIAN REGISTERS FOR WORK

Native of Asia Will Study Chemistry in University.

Lazarus Mallek, a native of Persia, has entered the University of Nebraska. Mallek will take a course in chemistry. He is now living in Lincoln and is doing other work in addition to carrying the university course.

Contrary to the usual custom of taking a university course as a preparation for the experience of actual life, Mallek has taken a varied and exciting career of experience in many countries as a preparation for his work in the University of Nebraska. He lived in Persia until twenty-two years of age. Then he traveled into Russia, preaching the gospel of the Presbyterians. During his seven years of ministering in Russia in the interests of the gospel he was imprisoned eight times. His persecution at length became so severe that he was forced to flee from Russia to America. Since arriving in America Mr. Mal-

lek has obtained naturalization papers. He will not return to his missionary work, however, until he receives the degree of M. D. This he intends to secure at Nebraska.

Mr. Mallek has two years of medical work already and within two or three years he expects to get his degree. He registered in the University of Nebraska last semester but because of financial difficulty he was forced to leave school.

Mr. Mallek is but thirty-six years old, yet he has traveled all over Europe and the United States. He was a student at Ashland College of Theology and also took work at Wesleyan University. His course this semester is entirely in the chemistry department.

Thursday morning the students in animal husbandry, at the state farm, will leave on a special train for South Omaha. Here they will study methods employed in the handling of live stock. The students will be in charge of Professor Smith, who will conduct them on an inspection tour of the stockyards and packing houses, in the morning. The afternoon will be devoted to lectures by government inspectors, who will use diseased animals to illustrate their lectures. At 5:30 p. m. the day will culminate in a big banquet, which will be served in the lobby of the Union Stock Yards Co.'s exchange building. A similar trip is planned for the students at the Iowa state agricultural college at Ames, Ia. The Ames students will visit the Sioux City, Iowa, stock yards and packing houses.

A LARGE DELEGATION

SEVENTEEN STUDENTS TO GO TO STATE CONVENTION.

PROFESSOR BARKER TO SPEAK

The Demonstration by University Men Planned to Aid Passage of County Option Bill Fails to Materialize.

The university Y. M. C. A. will send a delegation to the state convention to be held at Hastings, February 18-21, which will be the largest ever sent from this school. Seventeen men from the university and five from the state farm go, making a total of twenty-four delegates. Last year Nebraska was represented by ten men. The delegates will leave Friday evening over the Burlington, returning Monday morning.

Those going from the university are: H. N. Plasters, H. L. White, A. H. Guthbert, C. A. Rutledge, R. E. Rice, G. N. Foster, K. P. Frederick, N. H. Reynolds, R. F. Curtis, F. J. Clarks, G. C. Kiddoo, E. N. Kuhn, A. K. Andrews, S. A. Mahood and J. L. Thomas. Besides there, J. L. Derkinderen, the general secretary, and Professors Barker and Heck will be present. J. L. Derkinderen will be the secretary of the convention.

Planned Demonstration.

Professor Barker of this university is one of the speakers on the program. Chancellor Strong of Kansas university will be present and speak on "The Student Objective." John R. Boardman of New York City, Dr. D. E. Jenkins of Omaha and John W. Hansel of Chicago are other prominent men who will address the convention.

Plans had been made by the University association to gather a body of men together to be present when the "county option" bill should come up for consideration and to show by their presence where they stood on the subject. For this purpose a number gathered yesterday morning, as this was the date set for the bill to come up, but it failed to materialize. The bill did not come before the legislature at the expected time, so the plan had to be abandoned.
