IOWA CITY, Ia., Feb. 16.—Burglars invaded the bedrooms of fair co-eds at Iowa university before dawn today, and met with more or less success in their robberies.

One burglar, at Delta Delta Delta house, captured pearl and opal rings, watches and money, belonging to Misses Enda Harper and Alice Clark of Burlington, while Miss Harper, paralyzed with fright, lay silent, unable to cry for help.

He then proceeded to the adjoining room and flashed his dark lantern's rays into the face of Mrs. Josephine Lewis, the matron of the sorority. She was awakened, leaped out, and drove the burglar away.

In the Delta Gamma sorority house, another burglar entered the room of Marjorie Mac Vicar, daughter of Former Mayor Mac Vicar of Des Moines, but her screams frightened him away. Neither robber was tracked by the police.
