FRATS MAKE A KICK

OBJECT TO BEING CLASSED AS CHARITABLE BODIES.

THINK PHONE RENTS TOO HIGH

Wisconsin Rate For Charitable Organizations Much Higher Than the Regular Rate, Hence Students Bring Suit.

Whether a college fraternity can be properly classed in the rate schedule of a telephone company as a "charitable institution" is the question raised by a formal complaint filed recently with the railroad commission of Wisconsin by Phi Alpha Delta law fraternity.

Under the classification of the Wisconsin Telephone company, according to the allegations of the complaint, fraternities are improperly classified and made to pay an excessive rate under the following rule: "Charitable institutions; to include churches, public libraries, * * * lodge meeting rooms," etc. The complaint charges that this classification is discriminatory when applied to fraternities, in that it assesses them at the high rate charged for "lodge meeting rooms," whereas other boarding and rooming houses in the city pay only the resident rate, which is somewhat lower. The complaint strongly denies that a fraternity is either a charitable organization or a lodge meeting room.

The complaint comes as a result of the rearrangement of charges made necessary by an order of the railroad commission that after September 1, 1908, all telephone service given free or at less than schedule rates should be discontinued. Up to that time most of the fraternities had received free or reduced rate service, and it was in the classification of the fraternity to comply with the order that the alleged injustice has arisen.

The complaint is signed by twenty-six members of the fraternity and is entitled Conrad P. Olson et al. vs. The Wisconsin Telephone company. The case will be conducted on the part of the complainants, in all probability, by members of the chapter, and on

DEAN WARD ATTENDS MEETING

Association of American Medical Colleges Meets at New York.

Dean Ward left for New York City yesterday, where he will represent the University of Nebraska at the nineteenth annual meeting of the Association of American Medical Colleges. This is an association of colleges, not of individuals, and the questions which are considered at the meetings of the association are not those connected with the science or practice of medicine, but rather plans and methods of medical education. Dean Ward was president of the association last year, and this year is a member of the judicial council and chairman of the committee on medical teaching.

This association is of interest to educators because of its object, which is to maintain a high standard of medical education, and because of the methods that it adopts to secure that end. No medical school that does not maintain a high standard of instruction is admitted to this association, and those which are members are dropped from membership when they do not live up to these requirements. In this way the best schools are separated from the poorer, a uniform standard is fixed, and those not admitted find added reasons for raising their standard of instruction.

New Book by Dean Costigan Is Spoken of Highly.

In the March number of the Illinois Law Review, of which Dr. Roscoe Pound is editor-in-chief, appears a review of the new book by Dean George P. Costigan of the law college, on American Mining Laws. Dr. Pound is now acting dean of the Northwestern law school, and is considered one of Nebraska's most noted alumni, having graduated from here in 1888.

KOMENSKY CLUB PUBLICATION

Official Organ of Society Just Distributed to Subscribers

The organized Komenisky clubs have just issued the first number of their official organ. Eight hundred copies of the magazine were published and these were sent out through the university postoffice. "Komenisky" has been chosen as the name of the publication, that being the name of the famous Bohemian pedagogue in whose honor the societies are named. The new journal is devoted to the development and organization of the Bohemian people of the country.

Miss Sara Hrbek, instructor in Bohemian in the University of Nebraska, is editor-in-chief of the magazine and Otto Kotouc, 1908, is business manager. Delegates from the other allied clubs also help in the publication, but the Komenisky Club of the Nebraska state university is at present doing the greater share of the work. Other university clubs prominent in the organization are those at Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota. Conventions of the organized clubs are held annually. Two of these have already been held, one at Cedar Rapids, Ia., and the second at Omaha.
