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ALL WORK IS STOPPED

HISTORICAL SOCIETY NOW LEFT
WITHOUT APPROPRIATION.

BUILDING CANNOT BE FINISHED

QUARTERS IN LIBRARY BUILDING
NEEDED FOR CLASS-ROOMS.

Other States Provide Handsome Build-
ings for the Use of the Societies.
Nebraska Not Up to the
Standard.

The State Historical society must
remain in its old quarters in the base-
ment of the Library building for the
next few years at least. The vetoing
of the appropriation made by the last
legislature for the purpose of erect-
ing a building has postponed the com-
pletion of the structure for an in-
definite period.

The legislature appropriated \$15,000
for the purpose of housing the histo-
rical society and, in addition, re-
appropriated \$15,000 of what remained
from the old appropriation, making
\$40,000 in all. The bill was vetoed by
Governor Shallenberger. The society,
however, contends that there was no
necessity of re-appropriating the \$15,-
000 as they had until August 31 to
use the remainder of the old approp-
riation. In the opinion of the at-
torney general, to whom the case was
submitted, the old appropriation does
not lapse until August 31, which will
enable the society to pay for the
work now under way.

Reason for Veto.

Governor Shallenberger gave as his
reason for vetoing the bill that he did
not believe in erecting public build-
ings by piecemeal appropriation. That
the present sum was totally inade-
quate to complete the structure and
that an appropriation should either
be made for the entire building or not
be made at all.

Active work has already been com-
menced on the future home of the
society, contracts having been let
and some work on excavation already
completed. These contracts agree-

gate \$15,110 and will give the society
the material for excavation, to put in
the foundation, all of the piers, and
lay the first course of granite, raising
the structure about three feet above
the assumed grade. This base will
be made of Woodbury, Vermont, gray
granite, hammer finished, and will
constitute in the opinion of those in
charge, the best foundation of any
public building in Nebraska. This ex-
penditure, together with superintend-
ents' and architects' fees will leave
\$7,500 of the old appropriation, of
which as much as may be necessary
will be used in putting a temporary
cover over the foundation to protect
it from the elements. John Fraas has
been employed as superintendent of
construction.

Expected to Move.

The society expected to be able to
move into the new structure in about
two years, and the rooms they now
occupy were to be turned into much
needed class rooms, but with the sud-
den turn of affairs, all these plans
will have to be dropped for the time
being. It is the opinion of those in
charge that the state must be edu-
cated to the need of such a building.
The work is hampered and cramped
at the present time for lack of room
as well as the imperative demand for
class room to facilitate the work of
the school.

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And in Windows.

Other states, of less financial pros-
perity, have provided far better for
their historical societies than has N
braska. The Kansas society applied
this year for the first time to its
legislature and received an approp-
riation of \$200,000 together with \$15,000
for a site and provision for the fur-
nishing of the building from another
fund, and this from a legislature fac-
ing a deficit of half a million. This
gives Kansas a building costing \$250,-
000. Iowa has one costing \$450,000;
Wisconsin one costing \$620,000 and
Minnesota plans to have one costing
a million and a quarter.
