**CHANGE ACCREDITING SYSTEM**

Smaller High Schools Accredited for Current Year Only.  
 At a meeting held recently the faculty committee on accredited high schools adopted a new regulation with reference to the grading of secondary schools. After this schools having less than four teachers engaged exclusively in high school teaching in addition to a superintendent will be accredited in June for the succeeding year.

In this way the smaller schools of the state will stand squarely on the merit of the work done during the year of inspection. They will be inspected in the spring and if their standard is sufficiently high their June graduates will be admitted to the university without examination. It is expected that schools with a larger faculty are not in danger of lowering their standard so quickly as is possible in small institutions and for this reason they are accredited for the year subsequent to the inspection. Students in the small schools must run the risk of finding their school non-accredited when the time for graduation comes.

**YALE MEN ON WATER WAGONS**

Seniors Vote for Water as Their Favorite Beverage.  
 The prohibition wave has hit the Yale senior class and 1909 academic has announced its vote for water as its favorite drink.

Beer has stood as the traditional drink for Yale seniors, except for one year, when the class played a joke on itself by voting for milk.

Coffee made a hot run with 19 votes, and 14 stood loyally for milk. Of the class, more than half confess they have used stimulants. It voted "Crossing the Bar" as its favorite poem.

Maude Adams is, as usual, chosen the favorite actress, with 116 votes against 19 for Ethel Barrymore, with 51 votes against 45 who like the theatre.

The class is overwhelmingly republican, only 261 saying that they belong to the democratic party, 16 to independent parties and one to the prohibition party. Next to Yale, Princeton is the favorite college, with 125 votes, and Harvard second, with 86 votes.
