HARVARD NOW HAS A SURPLUS

Football the Only Form of Athletics That is a Money-maker.

A surplus of \$26,091.10 in receipts over expenditures in all lines of Harvard athletics is shown by the report for the college year 1907-08 issued at Cambridge by Henry S. Thompson, graduate treasurer of athletics at Harvard. The total receipts were \$127,318.44 and the total expenditures \$101,227.34. The total net surplus exceeds by \$14,450 the surplus of the previous year, the gain being due in part to increased receipts from football and baseball and in part also to a decrease in the expense of football coaching and the training table. With the exception of football and

baseball, all the sports show a deficit for the year. The total receipts from football in the fall of 1907 were \$82,546.37 and the expenses \$19,894.97, leaving a surplus of \$62,651.40. The report says that there has been a decrease of 50 per cent within the last three years in the expense of football management, including the training table, supplies and salaries of coaches. Joshua Crane, who was head coach in 1907, refused to accept the salary for his services and thus contributed largely to the reduction of expenses. The cost of the track team was \$9,991.13 and the receipts were \$5,556.97, leaving a deficit of \$4,434.16. In all the minor sports, including hockey, basketball, soccer, lawn tennis and swimming, a deficit is shown by the report.
