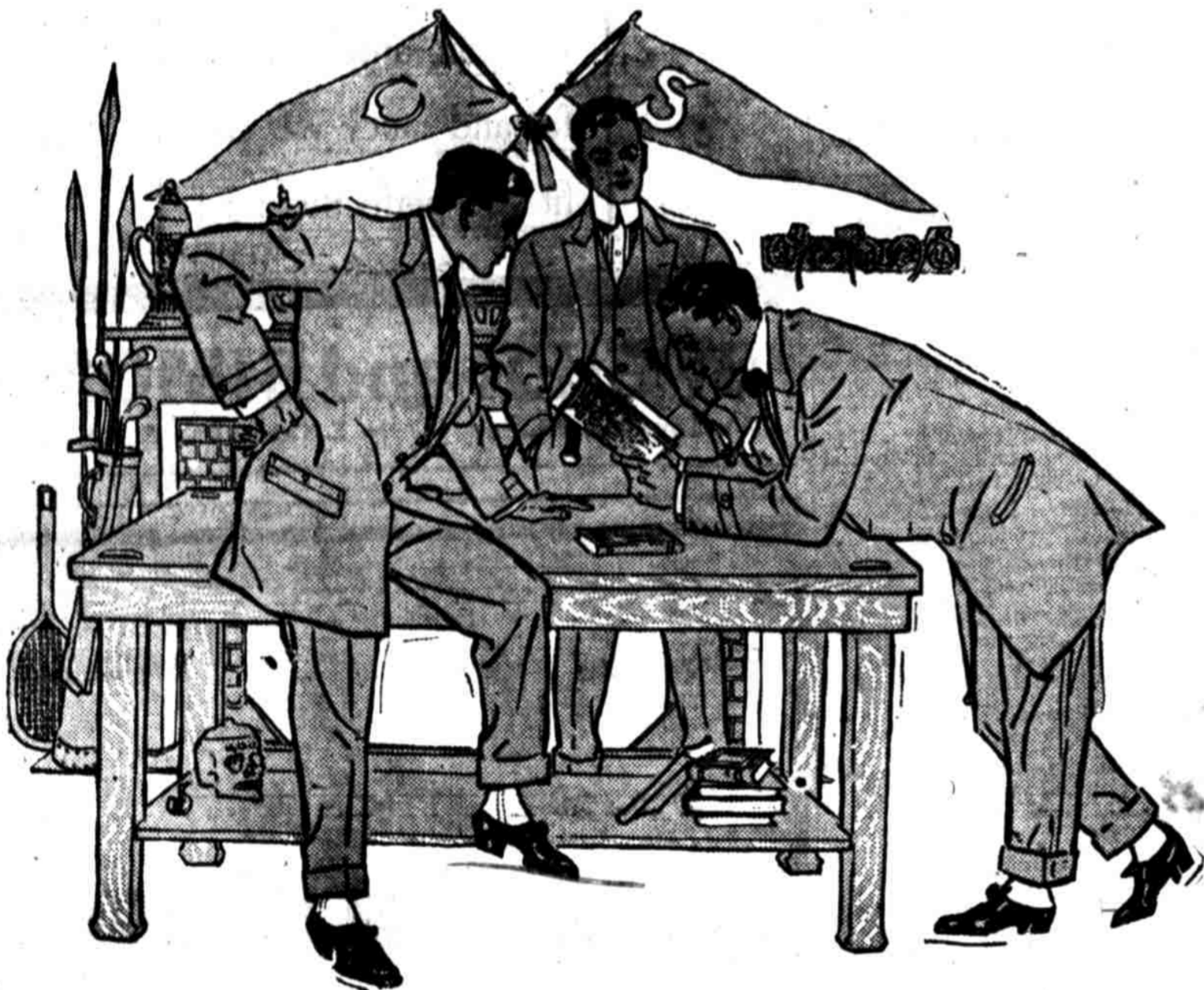

**PROF. FOSSLER DISCUSSES TRIP THROUGH EUROPE.**

**LACK OF MONOTONY IN TOURS**

**GERMAN ARCHITECTURE DEVELOPS BEAUTY.**

**Lack of Space Makes it Necessary for Farmers to Use Strict Economy on Their Lands—New Slides Interesting.**

Professor Laurence Fossler gave an illustrated lecture at convocation on Thursday morning on the subject of "Vacation Rambles Through Europe." Most of the scenes were confined to village life, and the cathedrals of Germany. Professor Fossler declared that he had received the slides very recently and had not seen them before himself. His aim was to give some idea of what one might see when traveling on the continent. Professor Fossler spoke in part as follows:

**Villages Picturesque.**  
"The villages are very numerous and picturesque. Every town or nearly so, has its church and art house. Very often these are very striking in design and beautiful. A great deal of the German architecture is of the Gothic type, as contrasted with the great domes and smooth lines of the Roman style.

"The Gothic architecture as seen in the great cathedrals is very intricate. The amount of work and labor required is very great. The towers and windows are high and narrow. The nave of the church is finished beautifully and gives one a feeling of rest. The cathedral of Bonne was finished only a few years ago though begun more than four hundred years earlier.

**Economy Necessary.**  
"The German farmer has to economize space all he can. On both sides of the Rhine for a great distance the steeply rising hills are terraced off to permit of cultivation. The effect is most striking. This great amount of work has all been done by the expenditure of much physical toil for it all had to be done by hand. On the tops of mountainous ridges are to be seen old castles built many years ago. In most cases these are still in an excellent state of preservation.

"The German towns do not have the sameness and monotony of our American cities. Most of the buildings have slant roofs and stand for the most part with the gable end to the street. The buildings are fairly large substantial structures. The cathedrals are also not only buildings of great beauty but of immense size. One may walk for many miles away from them and yet the cathedral will be in sight.

"The patterns worked into the structure of the exterior are designs of real art. As compared with the cheap artificial designs produced in America to serve a similar purpose, the German production takes on still greater beauty.

"The notable fact about all these places is the ruggedness, massiveness and substantial construction along with a type of architecture of much beauty and grace."

**Unpopular Course at Minnesota To Be Abolished by Regents.**

Twenty-six instructors teach three students in the college of homeopathic medicine at the University of Minnesota. This is probably a record which has never been equalled in the entire world.

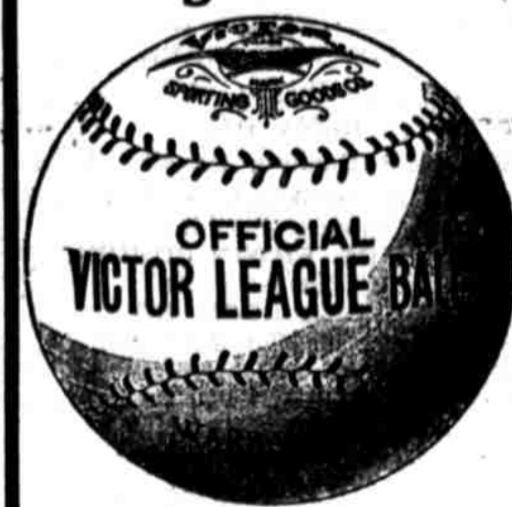
