Business and Professional Men to Work With Trustees.

Announcement is made by A. L. Ryland, financial secretary that the trustees have decided to introduce the Harvard plan of administration at Spokane college and will share the management with a council composed of forty business and professional men. Specific plans for the development of the institution will be considered by the council at its organization meeting in June, "and," Mr. Ryland adds, "everything possible will be done to meet the educational needs of Spokane and to make the college attractive to young men and women in the Inland Empire."

Mr. Ryland states that 180 students have been enrolled this year, under the direction of S. G. Logan, field secretary, with a prospect for more than double that number in 1910. He announces also that an endowment fund is assured for the college and with the council to handle the funds there is every reason to believe the money will be expended to the best advantage.

**HOLD A PUNTING COMPETITION.**

Princeton Tries New Method of Developing a Kicker.

A silver cup has been offered to the winner of a punting competition to be held at Princeton during the coming week. The competition will start every afternoon at 2:30 promptly, and is open to all men who are eligible for next year's football team. The object is to bring out new material and to encourage men with any ability in this line.

Both distance and accuracy will be taken into consideration. Every afternoon the competitors are to have fifteen kicks apiece, in every case receiving the pass from a center. Nine of these kicks will count for distance and the remaining six for accuracy.

First place every day in both distance and accuracy will each count five points, while second and third will count three and one points respectively. The cup will be awarded to the man securing the highest number of points, out of a possible fifty, during the five days of competition.
