MAY HOLD A RIFLE MATCH.

Outdoor Meet Being Arranged for the Western Schools.

There is a strong probability that a "Western Rifle Match" will be held at either American Lake or Monterey, Cal., during June, this match corresponding to the national intercollegiate rifle shooting match which will be held at Seagirt, New Jersey, at the same time. The movement in behalf of such a shooting match for western colleges is being forwarded by the commandants of the military schools at Berkeley, Nevada, Utah, O. A. C., Idaho, Montant, the Talma Pais Military School near San Francisco, and other western schools that maintain departments in military tactics.

The idea of holding a western match was suggested by the difficulty which western schools experience in sending their champion teams to Seagirt, New Jersey, to participate in the intercollegiate outdoor rifle match which is annually held there.

The State College team of Washington already has the championship of colleges and universities of the United States on indoor ranges, but to win the outdoor championship it will be necessary for the team to go to Seagirt, which will involve much expense. The schools mentioned above hope to be able to bring about the holding of the western meet, which will enable the determining of a championship on outdoor ranges without the great expense of a trip to New Jersey.
