BOTANIST IS ALSO MECHANIC.
 Former Nebraska Man Does Work in
 Both Fields.

In recent issues of the "Electrician
 and Mechanic," a technical magazine,
 there appeared two articles by P. J.
 O'Gara, 1902, which are descriptive of
 ingenious inventions of the author.
 One is the design of a modern double-
 acting pump and the other is a plan
 for the construction of a home-made
 electric heater.

Mr. O'Gara is remembered by old
 students of the university as a student
 of botany who had exceptional me-
 chanical ingenuity. Some of the ap-
 paratus which he designed was used
 for years in the department in which
 he majored. He is now an assistant
 in the national department of agricul-
 ture with headquarters at Medford,
 Oregon.
