NOTED THINKER TALKS

MR. JAMES DOLE SPOKE AT CON-
VOCATION YESTERDAY.

"THE SPIRIT OF DEMOCRACY"

Declares That Mankind Should Edu-
cate Itself to Be the Greatest
Benefit to Humanity in
a Democracy.

Mr. James Francis Dole, of Mass-
achusetts, addressed the convocation
Friday evening. Because of almost
no announcement the attendance was
much smaller than was deserved. Dr.
Dole is considered one of the great-
est thinkers since the time of Em-
erson and so was especially qualified
to speak on the subject of "The Spirit
of Democracy." His key note was
that democracy would reach its ideal
as mankind came to educate itself
with the idea of being the greatest
benefit to the community. Continuing
he said:

Nature Subservient.

"It is man's duty to make all na-
ture subservient to him. It is this
power of adjustment in man that
makes him the superior being. Living
together in a society each bears a
relationship to the other and are so
enabled to have human relations one
with the other. In political life there
opens up duties of the greatest mag-
nitude and demanding the strongest
and most united effort. Efforts requiring
the noblest of human qualities. Think
of the education and training which
is necessary to attain this high stand-
ard which should be set.

"A forgotten element of education
is the development of openminded-
ness. Darwin's spirit is an example
of this quality. He was always ready
and willing to learn or to be correct-
ed. Great men always show a will-
ingness to be taught. Modesty is an-
other desirable quality. We may de-
fine it as a lack of self conceit. It
has been said that sending a boy to
college takes the conceit out of him,
but this same training may give him
habits and faults equally bad. Any-
thing in a man's character that
arouses the suspicions of his neigh-
bor is a bad element, and lowers his
power and efficiency. Another hu-
man weakness is the lack of con-

"Democracy demands that we all
work together; co-operating with
each other to bring about results. In
civil reform old party affiliations are
being put aside because there must
be a unity of operation. Every col-
lege student should leave college with
these ideals ingrained in order that
he may be of more value to society.
Combined with these qualities there
must be a bulldog tenacity for public
interests. We find such men in every
community but we need more of them.
Knowledge may become burdensome
when not put into useful channels.
Our highest ideals should be the de-
velopment of these characteristics and
become real men in all that the term
implies."
