CREDIT TO TRACK MEN.

The track meet which was held at the University of Nebraska last Saturday, proves conclusively that Nebraska has a track team of which she may well be proud. Nebraska has always been strong in track athletics and by defeating both Minnesota and Kansas this year's team has proven that it is worthy of the university, and deserves the hearty support of every student.

The defeat of Kansas last Saturday was the first time this season that a contest with Kansas has not resulted in the scarlet and cream coming out with the small end of the score. It was the first time this year that Nebraska's representatives in any line of sport have proved their superiority to the Kansas men. Smarting under a long series of defeats by Kansas the victory on Saturday was all the more gratifying to all who have the interests of Nebraska at heart.

The Nebraska track team is this year laboring under peculiar difficulties for it has not the opportunity of training on the university campus. The athletes are compelled to go a long way from the university every day and the interest of the student body is greatly decreased by this fact. In spite of all these handicaps the Nebraska track team has made a brilliant success of the present season and all credit is due to Captain McDonald and his band of track athletes.

A FENCING CONTEST TONIGHT.

University Championship to be Settled in the Armory.

At 8 o'clock this evening a fencing match for the university championship will be held in the armory. Two trophies are offered the winners of first and second place by Captain Workizer and Dr. Clapp. Eight or ten men will take part in the match and some good work is expected.

The winner's name will be engraved on shields to be placed in the trophy room. When the shields are filled with names annually added, new ones will be provided.

ELIGIBILITY RULES ENFORCED.

University of Washington Rules Out Summer Baseball.

The discussion of the advisability of summer baseball is arousing a great deal of discussion at the university of Washington and it is declared that the strictest eligibility rules will be enforced at that institution next year.

"One of the most serious problems in university athletics will confront the athletic committee of the university this summer in the matter of professional baseball," said Dean Milnor Roberts, chairman of the faculty athletic committee recently. "I wish all men who intend to turn out for football to avoid playing summer baseball, as the slightest suspicion of professionalism will disqualify them."

under this head. Even if the men refuse the monetary reward offered they will be considered ineligible. The strictest construction will be given to the amateur ruling next fall."

THE LEGISLATURE GIVES \$800,000.

University of Missouri Fortunate in Appropriations.

Under the appropriation bill as finally passed by both houses the University of Missouri receives from the general fund for support, \$350,000 and from the collateral inheritance tax fund for the university, \$451,200. This is an increase over the house action of \$65,000. Several items were materially changed by the senate and the conference committee.

The appropriation bill for soil survey was increased from \$5,000 to \$15,000, for the experiment station from \$10,000 to \$15,000. The appropriation for clinical instruction, \$10,000, was changed to read for medical instruction. Other appropriations given for specific purposes were grouped under the head for horticulture and botany.

TO FORM NEW ATHLETIC UNION.

The Girls at the University of Minnesota to Control Their Athletics.

The co-eds of the University of Minnesota are taking active steps to form a girls athletic association. If present plans materialize the new board will have full control of all women's athletics at that institution.

The purpose of the association will be to control and develop athletics for women at the university. The active membership will include every girl registered in college, while the women of the faculty and others interested, will be admitted as associate members.

The board of control will be an executive committee of nine members which will be composed of a president and vice president and class representatives.

It will be the endeavor of the board to pay the expenses of the association as nearly as possible from the gate receipts and they will have entire charge of all the finances of the various athletic enterprises of the girls.

A student at De Pauw has been denied credit for his term's work in rhetoric because he copied a theme from a book. This is the third attempt of the kind there this year.

Announcements have been made at Brown of several courses that will be added to the curriculum next year, and of some that will be dropped. Changes in the faculty are also announced.

The girls at Minnesota held a mass meeting recently to devise plans for checking the spread of petty thieving in the university. Girls were excused from all classes to attend the meeting.

The Wisconsin girls have published their "Lady" number of the Sphinx. They claim to be "a little tired of furnishing material for Cardinal editorials and feature stories when advertisements are scarce."

The "Skull" pledges at De Pauw were put on duty at the game with Indiana, to see that all the fellows were seated in the rooting bleachers. They broke up many happy couples, but they weeded the men out of the grandstand.

A new scheme of financing student enterprises is being proposed at Washington. The plan is to charge every student five dollars, the payment of which will give him a subscription to the Daily Wave and admission to all contests and entertainments conducted by the Students' Association.
