NOW RECONSTRUCTED

ADDITION BUILT ON THE OLD WOODEN STRUCTURE.

Better Facilities for Doing Work of the Astronomy Department Provided for Professor Sweezy's

Classes.

During the past summer the old wooden observatory building used by the astronomy department was reconstructed outside and in and also considerably increased in size. Part of the new addition is used for an office by Professor Sweezy and the rest enlarges the study room to a length of twenty-eight feet. The outside of the new building is finished in white stucco, with a dark stucco base for contrast; inside the walls are light, with the wood trimmings separating sides and roof are painted brown, making a decidedly attractive color scheme. The metal roof and dome are painted white, as every observatory should be, to keep down the temperature in the instrument rooms. The stucco gives a decidedly more pleasing appearance than the brick

The inside has been refinished and refurnished. The floors throughout are covered with linoleum and the walls are decorated in a light brown. the department intends to fill it with transparencies of astronomical interest, such as views of planets, noted observatories, astronomical instruments, portraits of eminent astronomers, phenomena like eclipses, and other similar pictures that will make an instructive and pleasing display.
