I. P. HEWITT CHOSEN TO COACH BASKETBALL
ATHLETIC BOARD HELD SPECIAL MEETING YESTERDAY.
IS A GRADUATE FROM NEBRASKA UNI.
 New Coach Was Prominent in All Lines of Cornhusker Athletics While in School.
 I. P. Hewitt will coach the university basketball teams this fall and winter. This was announced yesterday noon after the athletic board had held a special meeting at 11 a. m. in Dr. Clapp's office.
 The special meeting was called for the purpose of passing upon recommendations for a basketball coach made by a committee appointed for that purpose at the last regular meeting. This committee, headed by Dr. R. G. Clapp, who has been coaching the teams in the past, recommended Hewitt, and the recommendation was approved by the board.
 I. P. Hewitt, who will have charge of this branch of Cornhusker athletics, graduated from Nebraska in 1904. He graduated from the law school and has since that time been practicing law in Lincoln. Hewitt is a well known athlete. He was one of the best basketball players Nebraska has ever had and, combined with this, he was a track man of ability.
All Around Man.
 Besides these two special lines of athletic work, Hewitt took up football. He was also the champion boxer of the school, and since graduation has aided "Jack" Best in instructing a class in boxing. He has for the last five years been coaching the Y. M. C. A. team and he has helped the high school boys in this line of work, as well as officiating at most of the contests on the Nebraska basketball floor and in the home track meets, Hewitt's selection is highly gratifying to the student body.
 Basketball and track have in the past gone without an official coach. Dr. Clapp, who has been doing the work, has done so in time taken outside of his regular duties. Of late Dr. Clapp's work has been growing so that he this year found it impossible to coach basketball and handle all of the other work at the same time. At the last meeting of the board he requested that a coach be selected. The matter was referred to a committee, whose selection, approved this morning, resulted in the securing of Mr. Hewitt. The matter of a track coach was postponed.
Seats for Girls.
 Another matter which the board took up at its meeting yesterday was the providing of \$1 seats at the football games for ladies unattended. In the past the only place, outside of the reserved section, that was open to ladies was the regular bleachers. As these are not always acceptable to small parties of girls, the board decided to have a section at the west end of the grand stand roped off for girls alone. This section will be open only to ladies, who will be admitted to it at general admission price. The section, as it is now intended, will seat about two hundred.
 The matter of the use of the field

by the Lincoln high school when it is not in use by the university was also taken up. It was decided that, in addition to the regular fee of \$10 charged by the building and grounds committee, the board would only charge the high school the expense of the work on the field. This will be the expense of marking and other minor details.
