A curious coincidence is noted in the American history department. The registration for this week is exactly the same as at this time of the first semester last year. Some changes have been made in the various classes, but the total is the same.

At the dedication of the new Y. M. C. A. building at the University of Missouri on Sunday, October 31, Dr. Theodore Gerald Soares, professor of homiletics and religious education and head of the department of practical theology at the University of Chicago, delivered the principal address.

Domestic science, a subject which is receiving increasing attention in colleges and high schools, has been added to the list of subjects which may be offered for entrance to the University of Chicago. This action has been taken by the faculties of the colleges of arts, literature and science, as a result of the growing demand for official recognition of this subject, and results in a balancing of the manual-training curriculum at the university by the placing of a purely feminine subject of education on a par with the masculine studies of mechanical drawing and shop work.

The "Chicago scholarship" at the University of Chicago has been awarded to Miss Florence White, 10312 S. Seeley avenue, Chicago for "high rank in scholarship." Miss White is a junior college student, and the scholarship covers the full annual fees of the university.

The abolition of fraternities and sororities from the high school of the University of Chicago has been followed by the creation of social clubs—one for boys and one for girls—rooms for which have been provided in the university buildings. Membership includes all of the pupils in the school. The plan is welcomed by scholars and teachers alike, as offering a practical and pleasant solution of a problem which was not without its difficulties.

SUSPEND THE EDITOR OF CALIFORNIA PAPER
STUDENTS AND FACULTY DISAPPROVE OF SHEET.
UNL. COMIC JOURNAL OVERSTEPPED
 Protests Against Material Published in the "Pelican" Causes the Withdrawal of Editor from School.

San Francisco.—Rollo Ewing Fay, editor of the Pelican, an alleged comic paper at the University of California, was suspended from college for the remainder of the academic year, and his publication suppressed because of its alleged indecent and immoral character.
 Editor Fay's suspension is through recommendation of the student body, acting through the undergraduate student affairs committee, and the action follows the accusation that articles published in the Pelican are detrimental to the good name of the university.
 On the committee's recommendation, acting President Lange suspended Fay and he is to be debarred from college attendance and privileges for the remainder of the academic year.
Tone Considered Low.
 The clipping of the Pelican's wings and the summary suppression of its fight is not, so it is declared, due to any single article in particular, but because of the general tone of the edition.
 The Pelican is bad, it is declared, bad from start to finish, from cover to cover, way below the mark which a big institution of learning should insist upon, morally, intellectually and artistically; quite too bad, it is declared, to be allowed to sail broadcast as representing the brains and brilliancy of the state university.
 The whole tone of the book is below the acceptable standards of morals, dignity and common sense, according to Ralph T. Merritt, secretary to President Wheeler, a sentiment that finds widespread approval in the prompt and severe measures taken against the editor.
 The responsibility of choosing the editor of the Pelican and generally supervising the publication is invested largely in the English Club, which is made up of professors, instructors and the literary effect generally among the students. Just how the suppressed editor got past the supervisors and censors is not explained.
