COMIC JOURNAL OVERSTEPPED

San Francisco.—Rollo Ewing Fay, editor of the Pelican, an alleged comic paper at the University of California, was suspended from college for the remainder of the academic year, and his publication suppressed because of its alleged indecent and immoral character. Editor Fay's suspension is through

recommendation of the student body. acting through the undergraduate student affairs committee, and the action follows the accusation that articles published in the Pelican are detrimental to the good name of the university,

On the committee's recommendation, acting President Lange suspend ed Fay and he is to be debarred from college attendance and privileges for the remainder of the academic year. Tone Considered Low.

The clipping of the Pelican's wings and the summary suppression of its fight is not, so it is declared, due to any single article in particular, but because of the general tone of the edition.

The Pelican is bad, it is declared, bad from start to finish, from cover to cover, way below the mark which a big institution of learning should insist upon, morally, intellectually and artistically; quite too bad, it is de-clared, to be allowed to sail broadcast as representing the brains and brilli-
