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DEBATERS' LEAGUE IS PLANNING FOR WORK

ANNUAL MEETING OF NEBRASKA ORGANIZATION HELD.

APPLICATIONS MADE FOR MEMBERSHIP

Amendments to Constitution Adopted Providing for Better System in Carrying Out Series of Debates.

The Nebraska High School Debating League, which was organized two years ago by Professor M. M. Fogg of the rhetoric department, and has since experienced a steady growth in numbers and popularity, held its second annual meeting at the Lindell hotel during the state teachers' meetings. There was much important business transacted.

Last year there were forty-eight members in the league, consisting in the most of the principal high schools of the state. This year there were a number of applications for memberships from other high schools who wish to benefit by the league's work. Among the number were McCook, Holdrege, Franklin Academy and Trenton in the southwest district; Broken Bow in the west central district; David City and Seward in the eastern district; Gothenberg in the western; Gordon in the northwestern; Grafton in the central, and Clay Center in the southern district.

Eleven Districts. For convenience the state is at present divided into eleven districts. In each district the schools pair off, the winners pairing off again until it is finally decided which school shall send their representatives to the state contest on high school fete day.

There were three important amendments to the constitution adopted. One sets December 1 as the date by which a school must apply for membership for the coming year. Another directs that the first series in each district shall be held not later than March 1. The third directs the executive committee, consisting of the president, secretary-treasurer and district directors, to redistrict the state at any time so that no more than eight schools comprise any one district.

Fogg President. Professor Fogg was again elected president of the league. Superintendent Charles A. Mohrman of Atkinson was elected secretary-treasurer, to succeed H. Clyde Filley, former superintendent at Albion, who is attending the university school of agriculture this year. The president is to appoint the district directors.

The question for the debate this year was selected by vote of the league last year. It will be, "Resolved, That labor unions are on the whole beneficial." This question will be the one used in the state contest as well as in the district contests. The district contest will probably begin some time in January and be held at various times until the fete day in May.

BULLETIN OF BOYS AND GIRLS.

Superintendent Val Keyser Issued Booklet for Nebraska Association. A new bulletin has just been issued by the University of Nebraska for Nebraska boys' and girls' associations. The bulletin was prepared by Prof. Val Keyser, superintendent of farmer institutes, and State Superintendent E. C. Bishop.

The annual state contests and convention of the boys and girls will be held at the city auditorium next January. There are many prizes offered the boys for the best samples of field crops and to the girls for domestic science exhibits.

The college of agriculture of the university will give a special course of instruction in agriculture and domestic science this year. Special arrangements have been made with the professors of the school of agriculture to give a course lasting five days. The school of agriculture will then be having vacation and while the regular students are attending the state meetings those from over the state can use their laboratories and class rooms.

"Dad and the Frats" the Title of the Production Which is to Be Staged Next Month—Muriel Culp the Author.

The first of the series of amateur dramatic events at the University of Kansas this year is to be the production of an original farce early in December which was written by Miss Muriel Culp of Lawrence, formerly an active member in the Masque Club, one of the K. U. dramatic organizations.

"Dad and the Frats," as the play is called, is a farce full of college atmosphere and is pronounced by university critics as remarkably clever. Miss Georgia Brown of Kansas City, who is to direct the production, said of it:

"It is one of the cleverest things I have seen in a long time and will certainly make a hit with the people on the hill."

The play will be given by the Thesplan Dramatic Club early in December.

An interesting feature of the production is to be the starring of "Tommy" Johnson, the University of Kansas quarter back, as the center of the complications in the plot. As the football hero in the play and in the further role of the all but despairing lover he occupies the main part of the plot on the third act.

The theme of the skit centers about the coming to college of a typical high school lad who is forbidden by his father to join a fraternity after he has already pledged himself to do so. "Dad" decides to come up and see about it, and the "frat" boys decide to turn the house into a Y. M. C. A. for the occasion and entertain the Y. W. C. A. girls for the old man's benefit. "Dad" proves not to be so slow and turns out a thoroughly good fellow to the extent of helping some of the boys out of a scrape involving a lot of humorous complications. After a glimpse of college life, with a liberal supply of football enthusiasm "Dad" decides that the "frat" is not so bad after all and becomes one of the boys.
