HAVE COLORADO CLUB

FORMER NEBRASKANS ORGANIZATION IN THE WEST.

OVER THIRTY AT THE FIRST MEETING

Club Plans to Attend Nebraska-Denver Game in a Body and Would Like to Meet Team in Evening.

University alumni and former students now living in Colorado have organized a University of Nebraska club, which has its headquarters in Denver. E. J. Churchill, 1885, is chairman of the club and H. C. Parmelee, 1897, is secretary. The following letter tells of the formation and purpose of the club:

Denver, Nov. 12.
Editor Nebraskan: The alumni and former students of the University of Nebraska have recently organized the University of Nebraska Club in Colorado, with headquarters in Denver, and are desirous that all Nebraskans shall know of the fact in order that those who may come to Denver to live, or who may be in the city for a time, may have an opportunity of meeting with old friends.

Our club was permanently organized on the 29th of October at a social meeting held at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hiltner. In response to about seventy-five invitations issued to Nebraskans throughout the state, there were thirty-three present. While Denver residents were probably in the majority, there were alumni present from Boulder, Fort Collins, Colorado Springs, and Del Norte.

The club has been launched with enthusiasm and there is no apparent reason why the interest should not continue. We have made arrangements for occasional social meetings and weekly luncheons at the tea room of the Denver Dry Goods company, where we shall be glad to meet visiting Nebraskans.

Arrangements have been made whereby the members of the club shall attend the forthcoming game between Denver University and Nebraska on the 20th inst., and it is probable that we shall meet the members of the team in the evening if it can be arranged in time.
