MISSOURIANS FAVOR GAME WITH NEBRASKA
FACULTY MEMBERS EXPRESS DESIRE FOR CONTEST.
WOULD PLAY AT KANSAS CITY
President Hill of Missouri, Formerly a Member of Nebraska Faculty Thinks it a Very Good Idea.

That the University of Missouri would not be averse to taking Nebraska on its football schedule is made evident by the following from the Daily Missourian:

Dr. A. Ross Hill, president of the University of Missouri, expressed himself this morning as heartily in favor of the re-establishment of athletic relations between the universities of Missouri and Nebraska. Dr. Hill formerly was a member of the faculty of Nebraska.

"I have a vital interest in both universities," said Dr. Hill this morning, "and I believe a football game between them would be of great benefit to both. The game, it seems to me, should be played in St. Joseph, which naturally, from its situation, is more interested in Nebraska than Kansas City is. Such a game would mean much to the alumni of the University of Missouri in northwest Missouri."

Nebraska also is believed to be in favor of resuming football relations with Missouri. A dispatch from Lincoln printed in the Kansas City Star yesterday expressed this sentiment. The game could be played either in Kansas City or St. Joseph, and would be a drawing card in either city. The Kansas City Star advocates playing the game in Kansas City, and says it would be a success financially for both universities, through the large crowds it would attract.

In case a game is scheduled with Nebraska it will be necessary for Missouri to drop some school from the present schedule. Sentiment at the university among students, faculty and alumni favors dropping at least one of the games in Iowa, or confining the schedule to teams west of the Mississippi river. This would mean the dropping of Monmouth College, or any other Illinois team.

What Dean Shaw Says.
Prof. H. B. Shaw, dean of the school of engineering, a member of the committee on intercollegiate athletics, favors scheduling a game with the University of Nebraska.

"I believe it would be a good idea to play Nebraska next year," he said this morning. "In fact, I think Missouri's games should be chiefly with state universities. Games with small colleges often do more harm than good. If Nebraska is in favor of scheduling a game with Missouri I believe it should be done at once."

Dean Shaw said St. Joseph would be as good a place as Kansas City, for the game. He believes the game would draw large crowds in either city.
